

MIMOGREDE

(Iz Ljubljane.)

— Iz mednarodne politike: "Riccioni, 21. avg. — V nedeljo dopoldne se je avstrijski kancler Dollfuss na Mussolinijevo povabilo vozil z jadrnico. Jadrnico je vodil Dollfuss sam, Mussolini pa je priplaval do jadrnice ter se med vožnjo povzpел nanjo. Tako sta oba državnika v kopalnih hlačkah nadaljevala politične pogovore, ki sta jih imela v soboto. Popoldne sta se spet prevažala po morju z jadrnico, zvečer pa je bil souper v Grand hotelu." — V zadnji orjanski "Pobedi" se neki jugosloven silno zgraža nad Hrvati, češ, da posebno v Hrvaškem Zagorju ljudstvo stalno prepeva tisto staro nabožno pesem: "Rajsko Djevo, Kraljica Hrvata," ki so jo na romanju k čudodelni Mariji Bistrički prepevale romarske množice že kar demonstrativno. Pisec vidi v tem prikrit separatizem in zakrinkano nasprotovanje jugoslovanskemu edinstvu.

— Dne 15. t. m. je dopolnil hrvaški kipar Mestrovic petdeseto leto svojega življenja. Bralce, ki so gotovo brali razne članke, napisane za ta jubilej, utegne zanimati tudi dejstvo, da je o kiparju Mestrovicu napisal pred nekaj meseci daljšo razpravo hrvaški znani pisatelj Avgust Cesarec, da pa ta razprava ni smela iziti v tisk. Mestrovic spada menda med nedotakljive.

— Nasilni režimi, kakršen je Hitlerjev v Nemčiji, imajo zmerom polne roke dela, da bi zbudili v prebivalstvu ljubezen do teh režimov. To vzgajanje ljubezni zaupajo sodstvu ter javnim in skrivnim razbijem. Na smrt obsojene in obsejane protidržavne elemente (kdor je namreč proti Hitlerjevemu režimu, tega razglasi režim za protidržavnega, kar je že stara praksa) bodo v Nemčiji celo razstavljali na trgih. S tem si hoče režim zamčrtiti ljubezen državljanov, mestom in trgov pa dati pristno nemško lice. Debatirajo pa tudi že o tem, da je obešanje nemški običaj in da je pristna nemška justifikacija: odsekati glavo s sekuro.

— Poznana stvar je, da umirovljeni uradniki posejajo parke, pa bilo Tivoli ali Zvezdo, za čijih lepoto so oduševljeni. Tudi tuje hvalijo Ljubljano, od koder se lahko pešice ali potom vlak napotijo na izlete. Zato je podvig tujskega prometa razumljiv. Tehle trih stavkov sicer nismo prepisali od nikoder, a lahko bi jih brali. Sestavljeni so iz besed, ki so izposojene "od integralčine" in ki jih najdemo celo v reviji, kjer se jih človek ne bi nadejal. "Podvig" se je kar udomačil pri nas, od kar so slovenski časniki poročali o "Carugovih razbojniških podvigih," in zdaj ga rabimo za vsak razmah in dvig. Kajti nam ni vseeno, ali pobijemo naše nemške sovražnike naše nemške domovine s francosko kiltjotino, pokazati moramo svoje germanstvo ter jim glav odsekati z nemško sekuro, pa čeprav je nemskim justifikancem vseeno, kako jim odsekamo njih nemške glave. Na nas je, da ostanemo zvesti svojim običajem svojim hemškim običajem, svojim nemškim rabljevim običajem. Le tako se bo nemški človek spenjal k višku na krilih kreposti svoje duše. Gre za našo čast! — Takele vesti o takihle metodah prihajajo iz Belgrada: V belgrajskem dnevniku "Politika" je lani izhajal kriminalni roman "Lov na dolarje", ki je bil od dnevnika nagrajen. Za avtorja sta bila podpisana Sučević in Todosić. Pred kratkim pa je hrvaški (vse premalo znani) mlad pesnik Nikola Šop sporočil "Politiki", da ta roman ni nič drugega kakor prevod romana "Trije okrog Violete", ki je izhajal v bratislavskem listu "Novi svet". Tam je bil za avtorja podpisan Aleksander Keller. Uredništvo je oba romana primerjalo in dognalo, da gre res za književno tatvino prve vrste. Oba "avtorja", Sučević in Todosić sta imela kot upokojena oficirja dovolj časa, da sta iz bratislavskega lista roman kratko in malo posrbila ter ga poslala "Politiki", ki je pač nasedla, ker ni dala kriminalnega romana kriminalistom in detektivom pregledati. Urednik feljtona "Politike", pesnik Ž. Milčević v zagovoru opravičuje list ter vprašuje: Ali naj posledje pošiljamo v književno juryje detektive in kriminaliste? Zakaj pa ne? 

Vrnite se v pondeljek 11. septembra. Vi boste protektirani... policija bo pazila, da se vam ne bo ničesar zgodilo pri izvrševanju vaših dolžnosti v tej veliki splošni krizi... Dva dragocena plačilna dneva sta že prešla brez plače za vas! Predsednik Roosevelt je izjavil, da ON NOČE stavk... on hoče več dela... višje plače... in zaposlene tovarne... Mi smo stoođstotno za njegov program... mi hočemo sodelovati... on je nam ukazal, da sodelujemo! Ameriška vlada tudi pravi... "ne nasilja"... vsak delavec, organiziran in neorganiziran ima pravico do svojega dela, ako ga hoče in če njegova plača soglašja z določbami pravilnika NRA. Zaraditega ni prav nobenega vzroka, čemu se ne bi vi vrnili na delo." Nato cirkular navaja plače, ki so jih kompanije pripravljene dati in zaključuje z velikimi črkami: "V naših tovarnah ni maksimalne plače. Zaslužite kolikor največ morete. Čimbolj boste delali, višji bo zaslužek."

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To je staro uvajanje akordnega dela, ki delavce in delavke, ki so plačani od kosa, naganja in naganja, da zaslužijo "kolikor morejo."

Growth and Progress

Every individual possessing the essential qualities for advancement is constantly striving for improvement. He is cultivating those elements within himself which will enable him to progress as an individual to serve his community and humanity in general. His desire for advancement must be based on altruistic principles if he wishes to perform his duties to his fellow men honestly and unselfishly. His progress depends on his determination and on his immediate environment.

What is true of an individual is also true of any organized group. The elements of progress in any organization are shown best by the growth and advancement exemplified by the achievements made and influence exercised by individuals and by the units of which the organization is composed. Where these organization units are disinterested no genuine progress can be expected but the inevitable disintegration will set in. On the contrary, where organization units composed of live wire individuals with common interest for their goal pull together, real progress will ensue in all instances.

The growth of our Society with its branch system scattered throughout the country during the past thirty years is attributable mainly to the elements of determination, loyalty, vision and unselfish hard work for a common purpose of mutual help and enlightenment. These qualities were amply exemplified by the unswerving work of our elders who have built this organization so faithfully.

The work and progress made in the recent years by our youth can likewise be attributed to our young people who helped to inaugurate the youth movement within our organization, and also to their elders who have so unrestrainedly offered assistance in their worthy endeavor. It was the mutual co-operation of both groups that led to success.

In spite of the severe times of recent years many local branches have withstood the impact of economic pressure and today are holding their own. In some localities this has been impossible, due either to the economic upheaval or to the various oppositions to our branches which has continued in different forms. But it can be truly said that the local branches of the SNPJ have been as they still are the real bulwark to the progressive labor spirit among our old and young generation.

Where among our branches progress lags it can invariably be found that within them personalities, selfishness and hatred retard its natural course. These elements are the chief obstacles to any real progress, and therefore must be annihilated in the bud. If fostered these enemies of progress will eventually lead to disorganization; where these elements find their way into any organized group the consequences are irreparable and the natural progress retarded. These elements, if not overcome and uprooted at the start, tend to devour all the energy and ability which otherwise would be very useful for the upbuilding of your lodge.

Petty squabbles should be avoided, but when they occur they should be ironed out tactfully before they grow into serious disputes and before they spread and involve the whole lodge membership into an affair which could have been avoided at the beginning. Hatreds should be suppressed. Intelligent members will suppress them in their origin and thereby prevent undesirable consequences. Lodge officers should always be on guard to check any and all ill-feeling and bad influences which are probably trying to creep into their lodge system and threatening seriously to obstruct its progress.

What is harmful to an individual might be in general also harmful to a lodge. Individual or group hatred is like a boomerang. It comes back and hits the one that hates and not "the other fellow". Promote harmony amongst your fellow members. Work for cooperation and general good will. By doing that you and your lodge will benefit morally and materially. With your earnest efforts for the promotion of lodge interest you will bring forth the best that is in you — human understanding and mutual interest on which all fraternal progress is based, and around which everything worthy of ourselves is pivoted.

It turns out that many industries cannot start without funds from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. Why not take over all the industries, give the capitalist owners a permanent vacation, give all workers jobs and end the agony?

It is said that the NRA gives labor a voice, but that voice will not be heard unless it is a roar.

We favor a labor code that will make it treason for a worker to vote for any capitalist party, but we doubt whether we can get a hearing before Administrator Johnson on that issue.

JUVENILE DEPARTMENT

The official announcement concerning change of assessment for the Juvenile Department and credit to which Juvenile members will be entitled after October 1, published in the official organ of August 30, has been subject to misinterpretation by Branch secretaries and members. The following additional information is given to that effect:

There shall be no change in assessment for the present members of the Juvenile department after October 1; nevertheless, these members shall be entitled to the accumulated credit for their period of membership at the time of their transfer to the adult department as any other member who pays according to the new scale of rates. The new Scale applies only to new members, who, if they are admitted before the age of ten, inclusive, shall pay assessment at a rate of 2c lower than that paid by the present members. This Scale adopted by the Supreme Board is just in all respects, a fact which must be admitted by anyone familiar with the management of fraternal societies, as assessment is paid according to the age of the child at the time of admission: the younger the child, the lower the rate. This should be a strong point for agitation in securing new members.

Applications of New Members

As provided by the present by-laws, Branch physicians must forward applications of new members directly to the Supreme Office. Due to omissions which have occurred in the first applications received, attention is called to a few points in that connection to prevent a repetition of the same errors in the future.

The first page of the application of every new member MUST BE FILLED OUT BY THE BRANCH SECRETARY AND SIGNED BY THE BRANCH OFFICIALS, as specified on the application blank, and the application is not to be given to the Branch physician until that is completed. Applications upon which the questions on the first page are left blank and the signatures of the Branch officials are omitted cannot be considered, and all such applications are returned to the Branch physician, who, in turn, must return them to the Branch to supply the omissions. To eliminate unnecessary inconveniences of this order, Branch secretaries are requested to follow these instructions carefully.

Passive Members

In regard to the decision of the Tenth Regular Convention which requires all passive members to refund the assessments into the mortuary fund: We conclude from correspondence to the Supreme Office that many are of the opinion that a passive member cannot become a member of the Society until he has made the required payments into the mortuary fund. This interpretation is erroneous. A passive member who does not refund his assessments into the mortuary fund may, at any time, be admitted into the Society as a new member, if he undergoes a medical examination and otherwise fulfills the requirements of the by-laws. But, any passive member who desires to be entitled to his former privileges, must necessarily refund all the assessments into the mortuary fund as provided by the by-laws.

Home Owners Loan Corporation Bonds

All those who have inquired whether the Society will purchase Home Owners Loan Corporation Bonds are hereby advised that, insofar as we have been instructed by the Insurance Department of the State of Illinois, the Society will invest in these bonds only in lieu of mortgages already held by the Society, and these only as approved by the State Director of Insurance. Investing Society moneys into Home Owners Corporation Bonds is not permitted because of the fact that the government guarantees only the interest accruing therefrom and not the principal. For better understanding to those interested, the following excerpt from the letter received from the State Insurance Department is quoted: "A copy of the opinion by the Attorney General of this State respecting investments by Fraternal beneficiary societies in these bonds was also forwarded to your Society, the sum and substance of that opinion being that an Illinois society might invest in these bonds only in substitution of its mortgages, where such investment was incidental to the collection or realization of an existing debt to such society, upon written authority granted by the Director of Insurance."

The contents of the above clearly specify the extent of permitted investments in the bonds mentioned.

NRA Revival Lags

Despite all the promises of better times which have accompanied the birth of NRA, the fact remains that the workers of the nation must look for the "New Deal" with hope rather than with the clear-sighted vision of understanding.

The codes themselves are little more than insults to that great section of the American people which measures its prosperity by the number of dollars in pay envelopes. With a set as the minimum under the Blue Eagle blanket code, the incomes which workers hope to get range downward to barely more than \$6 for laundry workers of the South. That is all that the "New Deal" is going to mean to the producers of wealth, then there is good cause to withhold enthusiasm.

However, let us be hard boiled. Let us assume that we care nothing about the welfare of the millions who are hoping for better and richer lives. Let them be damned, if you please. But then what? What is there in an attitude for the monster corporations which depend upon a wide field of purchasers for their prosperity?

It goes without saying that a \$14 man cannot support a family and an automobile. Nor can he scarcely be expected to become a probable customer for the big industrialists who have pooled their millions in industries which manufacture electric refrigerators, vacuum sweepers and other refinements of civilization.

The point that all this makes is that, while the codes do not promise prosperity for slaves neither do they promise customers for masters. Therefore the vicious cycle of depression has not been reversed and depression is not on its way out as enthusiasts, sycophants and charlatans like to tell us.

When the NRA first blared its blatant boasts of 5,000,000 more workers employed by Labor Day it laid the groundwork for its failure. More failures are certain to follow. Already the composite business index, which had been on the upgrade since the national administration shot a load of confidence and inflated the arm of the American business interests is taking a downward course. There are real reasons why a secondary collapse, even more terrible than anything that has thus far occurred, should come to pass. In fact, so far as we feel that such a collapse is inevitable, less the administration does what it has thus far failed to do; namely, take profits from owners and give wages to the workers in sufficient quantities to enable the many to buy those things which have hitherto been available only to the few.

Will the NRA do that? We don't think so. Such a step would take all the sweets out of industrial recovery—from the viewpoint of the class to which Roosevelt belongs. For whether they admit it or not, the rulers of this nation are still looking for a way of making business profitable for the owning class. As for the toiling masses, all they hope for is to find some way of putting the back to work.

Public Ownership Points The Way

The rate cut announced recently by the Union Electric Light and Power Company of Saint Louis marks a radical departure from the policy of privately-owned power plants that is, if further inquiry does not reveal "joker" in the proposal.

Public ownership usually makes rates so small as well as the large consumer as low possible. It operates on a narrow margin, makes profits because low rates encourage consumption.

Ontario is the best example. In Ottawa, Canadian correspondent of LABOR, with a modest income which newspaper men here can afford to use more than 1,000 kilowatt hours of current in his house each month cause the rate is less than one cent.

The average household in the United States uses from 40 to 50 kilowatt hours per month but in many instances the household monthly bills are as large as those of a Canadian correspondent.

In other words, private ownership generates charges the small consumer all the traffic to bear—or something more—though often making low rates to big industrial consumers.

The low rate of public ownership is based on the true philosophy of mass production. Whether the article made be kilowatts or automobiles, mass production to permanently succeed must cheapen the cost and be content with a small profit from each unit. So far as domestic consumers are concerned, the Power Trust has been going on the theory that you are never sure of catching a customer but once, and a better skin him while you can.

In the long run, even a Power Trust must be able to see that extortionate prices are stupid as well as wrong.

Here and There With Comrades

Cleveland, O.—"OUR JUVENILES—THE HOPE OF THE FUTURE" These words opened an editorial in the English section of Prosveta, Wednesday, August 30. The Editor continued: "The juvenile department of the Slovene National Benefit Society is our most important factor, for the future of the Society, and our junior members are our greatest asset. Their importance in our organization cannot be overlooked."

These words were never written by me, but what are we, as members of the SNPJ, doing as a whole to keep and increase our greatest asset? Very little. We are taking them into our organization more or less as a matter of fact, but what are we doing to them and instill in them the spirit and principles of our organization? Again, very little. It seems that the only thing being done for them is to have them join the organization, after which we simply forget them. We just let them be, as they keep on paying their membership dues. It is not until we publish the Mladina List solely for their benefit, that this one item is just one of many that could be utilized for purposes necessary to instill in them the spirit and principles of our organization.

Some many years ago, the English speaking members organized separate lodges, the result being that the most satisfying in the history of the SNPJ. Today our English speaking lodges of large membership are a vital part of the SNPJ. Bold and courage, backed by a sound and good leadership make a recognized group in the SNPJ. And so it is with our juveniles. Let them have a hand in the work of the organization and we will do more to increase our membership than any other kind of an undertaking.

At this point the writer would like to know how successfully the Croatian National Union is dealing with its juvenile department. It has the juveniles in the organization in a separate organization called the Junior Order. This was adopted at the National Croatian Society convention held in Cleveland, in 1915. This society, with other orders, merged into the so-called Croatian Fraternal Union in 1925.

Large Juvenile Groups
The Union kept the Junior Order and followed the principles set forth by the National Croatian Society by keeping its juveniles in a separate body. In Cleveland alone, there are six separate such orders, and in other parts of the country, there are many more. These six orders total a membership of over 2000 juveniles. Who was mainly responsible for such large membership? The fact that the Croatian Fraternal Union realized the important part the juveniles played in the organization in years past, nursed these juveniles in its principles, in the juveniles' stages of lodge activity. In Cleveland, Nest 55, one of the six orders, has a membership of over 900 juveniles. An administrator elected from the senior lodges supervises the activities of these youngsters. He is aided by three members of the

senior auditing committee. The administrator selects the older juveniles members as officers and committees in regulating the business of the Nest. Meetings are held every month and often bring an attendance of 300 members. Dramatic clubs, lectures, music, sports and other programs suited for the fancy of the juveniles are an essential part of every meeting. This activity is one of the main reasons why the Croatian Fraternal Union has a large juvenile membership.

When it is realized that these juveniles, ranging in age from six to sixteen, take an active part in all Croatian functions (by that I mean affairs sponsored by senior organizations and doings of their own) it is no small wonder then, that the Croatian Fraternal Union is having such wonderful success with its juvenile problem.

The Hope of the Future
"The juvenile department of the SNPJ—its juvenile members—is the hope of the future—our future, the future of the Slovene National Benefit Society," continues the Editor in his writing. Serious consideration should be given to our juvenile problem, not only to the point of enrolling them into our organization, but also in keeping them and teaching them the principles of our organization. Teaching them these things in their youthful years, will make them better fit to take active part in our SNPJ in latter years, for they will be able to do this with a better and clearer understanding of the tremendous importance of the task that awaits them.

Promulgating activities of interest to the juveniles to such an extent that it will make them realize and feel that they have an active part in the work of the organization, will be far-reaching in enrolling them—keeping them—in preparing them for worthy and loyal senior membership.

The Supreme Judicial Committee has, by unanimous vote, found Bro. Steban guilty of violation of Sec. 8 of article XVI of the By-laws, and affirmed the decision of the Branch Trial.

Universal Comets

Universal, Pa.—The Comets' next social affair will be a dance on Oct. 28. It will be our Annual Harvest Dance. More information will be given regarding this affair. Sister Lodges are asked to please note this date, so that it will not conflict with our affair.

Since article "Passive Members" in the by-laws is a new article, some of its points are very discouraging according to instructions in the official notices. Due to existing conditions the Supreme Board has been empowered to readmit without medical examination members who were cancelled Jan. 1, 1933 or after.

On Aug. 10, 1933, the Supreme Board passed a decision that passive members will be credited for their assessment during their passivity not to exceed a total of six months. All assessments in arrears for a period longer than six months, must be paid into the mortuary fund.

The Comets have in their lodge two certain members who are brothers. One of them is an active member—the other a passive one. The former or active brother, whose age is 17 years, is insured for \$250 death benefit only. This brother pays an assessment of 54c (including local fees) per month. The latter or passive brother, whose age entry is 16 years, will, when reinstated pay a sum of 51c, for which he is to pay in arrears on his \$600 policy. The distinction in this category is that the one who pays more is insured for less, the one who pays less is insured for more.

Many of the so-called passive members are in an uproar with impressed ideas upon their minds as to why they should pay in arrears prior to July, when the old by-laws were supposed to be valid until then.

Will a young passive members re-instate, or will it be to his advantage to drop out and reenter as a new member? And what about the older members, must they stand by and take it on the chin?

Here is another change concerning this particular article. Active members who desire to become passive must fill out "Application for passivity" and submit it to local branch for approval. These can be procured from local secretaries.

Why I Laugh

Universal, Pa.—It gives me a laugh, not one of mirth or humor, but rather one of satire and cynicism not mixed with sympathy because of the tragic pathos involved, at the naivete I behold in people who believe that President Roosevelt and the Democratic administration will bring prosperity to the nation. The Brain Trust, however altruistic in designs, will surely fail to make the New Deal good. This seems to be a rather bold, bold statement to make, but let's scan the facts with which I substantiate this statement:

In the first place no administration which rides to power simply on the waves of discontent against an incumbent administration, has the moral force, the positive, basic sentiment behind it, of constituents intellectually awake and conscious of what they really want. It is common knowledge that this administration was elected through the negative vote of the people, and any administration whether it be Republican, Democratic, Socialist, Communist or that of any other party has as much chance for success as the proverbial snowball in hell, when elected on such fragile grounds.

No one is foolhardy enough to say that the votes cast for the Republicans—with their rugged individualism and vaguely phrased promises; no immediate platform worthwhile, nor vision of a program tending to the practical establishment of a future better society—nor the votes cast for the Democrats—with their promise of prohibition repeal, a New Deal from none knew nor were told what kind of a deck; also no vision of a program tending to the practical establishment of a future better society—were votes cast by an intelligently voting citizenry.

In striking contrast the Socialist Party stood out. It had a fitting immediate platform to meet the national emergency. A real program for the building of a good future society. Good records and traditions to which it could proudly point, and leaders who as its leaders in the past, showed marked evidences of altruism in their lives together with ability and action. Yet the Socialists polled only about 2% of the total votes cast, and of these votes, it is questionable how many were cast intelligently and how many were cast simply in protest.

Yet anybody who votes for Socialists in the local elections this year, or in the Congressional elections next year, or in the Presidential election in 1936 (providing the right to vote still exists then) without knowing what Socialism is all about will do about as much good and will be just as foolish as he who voted for the Democrats last year on the strength of their past record, what they now offered in their platform, or in simple protestation.

In the second place, assuming that President Roosevelt and his Brain Trust are sincerely and primarily interested in improving the common weal, what real backing do they have from Democrat leaders in all of the states—everywhere—to fight down the powerful forces of greedy capitalistic reaction. Especially when it is considered that these same leaders are part of this reaction? After all, a small handful of men are helpless against such odds.

Yet what do we see? Local Democrat leaders, politicians, public officials—all are "cashing in" on the popularity caused by the New Deal. These people since they were not, and are not now, conscious of a movement for the better (there wasn't any definitely written into the platform), are on the surface vociferously applauding and clapping hands at supposedly efforts, at improvements, and underneath, between claps, are closing their fists and smacking each other on the nose in their mad scramble for political spoils, jobs, patronage so that they can strengthen their own politicians.

Do you wonder then that one could just double up and roar with laughter, and effect a countenance so grotesque as to be suggestive of a wink being swallowed by an earthquake? I don't. Maybe I'm wrong. I hope so. Max G. Kumer, Lodge 715.

The Equation of Prosperity

On the inner east side of the Hall of Science at the Century Exposition you are confronted with a chart of the tree of Progress, graphically showing you that at the root of the tree, the basic science of all sciences is mathematics. Inasmuch as that seems to indicate that that vast field of scientific development is founded on that "stale" study which public schools of today are striving to eliminate from their list of requirements, it still maintains its popularity even in the present times. For turn where you will in these days of "recovery" you are met with what may be interpreted as an equation of prosperity, solved by the Brain Trust of this country which took long and rapid strides toward a quick return to prosperity.

Their reasoning of this equation, if analyzed in comprehensible language, would consist of the following terms: Business is at a standstill. Something urgent is necessary to make the wheels revolve. Now, goods, products, or what you will, cannot be brought into circulation as long as they remain stocked up in warehouses and permitted to rot there. And they cannot leave the storehouses if the wages of the people are not sufficient to purchase them.

Very simple. The thing to do is to increase wages. The miracle has happened. People have more money, they will buy (that era-famous phrase of consumers' demand), and the rotation will have started. The reasoning is sufficiently simple for anyone to understand without much effort, and, as it stands, reasonably convincing.

Now the equation is balanced, and the result "comes out even." That is the contention of the Brain Trust instrumental in giving us the present economic equation. But applying the formula definitely to the actual conditions, as we inevitably must, do the scales unquestionably balance? Is it true as it is presumably supposed to be that the employers are satisfied with incurring a few obligations and increasing wages, and that the wage-earners are materially benefited and rest contented with the feeling that the cards have finally been stacked in their favor and that much-caricatured holder of money bags has relented? Not so. The scales in reality are not balanced. For the optimistic mathematicians seem to have overlooked that while they set a limit for one side of the scale, they placed no limitations on the other. The wage-earner has a minimum of wages to which every employer may agree, but the employer has no minimum or maximum of prices he can set and to which his fellow wage-earner must also agree. And so while the wages have perhaps somewhat increased, the prices of commodities have correspondingly or surpassingly increased. Such has been the history of labor achievements through struggles since all time.

The present compromise admits of no difference. It is a promise with industry to cooperate, which it will consent to insofar as it will be forced to cooperate—providing the end result for it remains the same. When one is forced to give with the one hand and privileged to take back an amount equal to or surpassing that with the other, wherein lies the change?

As long as we do not alter the system itself—that system of employers and wage-earners where each struggles for the most that can come to him, it matters not what road is traveled to reach the incidental destination. Such changes will come only with the day when the system of economic management is changed to one of economic equality from one of economic servitude. An equation cannot come out even as long as there are unequal terms on both sides.

Gillespie, Ill.—The largest assemblage ever attending a labor celebration in the history of Illinois gathered in Benld, Illinois, September 3 and 4. It is estimated that 50,000 people were in attendance, and spent the days marching, singing, watching the competing drill teams, and listening to a wonderful program of entertainment and speeches.

People came from all directions—east, west, north and south. They came in all sorts of conveyances, some in automobiles, some on foot, but most of them in trucks. This mighty army of determined men and women came to celebrate the victory of their emancipation, and to show their solidarity, and determination to carry on. They came from the strike torn areas, where gunmen and thugs club and murder, where law has broken down and life is cheap, to find a haven of rest and contentment in Macoupin County, where American laws and institutions are still held sacred.

The parade on Labor day moved on schedule at 9:30 o'clock, led by a massed flag contingent and Amalgamated band of 50 pieces followed by state officers of the Women's Auxiliary and 46 auxiliaries. It was a magnificent and inspiring spectacle. Approximately ten thousands were in the line of march and the streets were packed to the curbing. There were 6 bands, one drum corps, and 28 floats, many of them very fine and picturesque.

Following the parade President Peary addressed the crowd. Preceding his address he was presented with a beautiful pen and pencil set by the merchant of Benld and with a box of cigars and a bouquet of flowers by the Women's Auxiliary.

Agnes Burns Wieck, president of the Woman's Auxiliary, gave a fine address also. She was presented by the local Auxiliary with a gorgeous bouquet of white flowers and sewing set by one of the Junior Auxiliary.

So ended another red letter day for Progressive unionism, and the greatest celebration ever held by labor in Illinois.

S. P. Program in the Coming Municipal Election

Cleveland, Ohio.—1. Unemployment Relief:—Work to be provided for the unemployed by tearing down the slums. Six hour day and five day week at union wages for all city work. Prevention of foreclosures on mortgaged small homes. City to take the lead in urging the state to set up old age pensions, unemployment, health and maternity insurance, to be financed by a tax on high incomes.

2. Municipal Ownership and Democratic Management of Public Utilities:—A publicly-owned transportation system, Expansion of the present municipal light, heat and power plant. Municipal gas distribution. Municipal banking.

3. Health:—More municipal hospitals and maternity stations. Free medical care for workers and their families. More visiting nurses. Public birth control clinics giving free advice. Thorough an adequate factory inspection. Abolition of sweatshops and sweatshop conditions.

4. Social Welfare:—An adequate public social welfare program to replace the private "community fund." Sanitary, municipal housing at cost through use of governmental powers, and the encouragement of genuine housing cooperatives.

5. Public Works:—Direct work under the city engineer instead of contract work in all municipal en-

terprises. Full protection of rights of workers to organize labor unions and to bargain collectively. Expansion of the present free employment bureau to a wide system, and the elimination of private agencies. Employment union labor on all city work.

6. Civil Liberties:—Removal of police restrictions on public assembly and freedom of speech.

7. Civil Service:—Rigid application of the merit system in the service. Civil Service Commission 3 members to be elected by the people.

8. City Government:—Revision of the city charter as follows: abolition of the ward plan; city council consist of 25 members elected large, proportional representation with party or group designation; office of mayor and council members; no city official to receive more than \$5,000 a year; abolition of the elimination process in primary elections.
