EDITORIAL REMARKS

FROM TRAVELING EYES



For whatever reason one may travel east along the shores of Lake Erie, a decision to see one of the seven wonders of the world becomes unanimous almost at any time. When the states are at one's disposal as a sightseeing trip or a journey of definite direction, Niagara Falls are always inviting. I come to find that each visit I pay there, intending it to be the last, becomes but the doorway to another. In this I discover a special reason; I am caught by nature's wonders, greater than man can create.

Located amidst a region where Indians paddled birch canoes and trappers used sleds on frozen waters for winter roads, paved highways now lead the way. Millions of visitors from all parts of the world see the wonders nature produced.

Four of us zoomed through dry, hot air, that has man praying for rain, passing good-sized towns and villages as we breezed along at a rapid pace on our way to Buffalo and Niagara Falls. Calm and placid as a pond the lake and river seems as we clip along. Neat farms and mostly vineyards are seen, separated only by railroads and a network of highways that cut the country into township squares. Our business intentions of the trip were quickly subdued by mental pictures and descriptions of the country surrounding us and the goal of my three colleagues gazing at the Falls for the first time while I received additional desire to view the angry waters of Niagara River once again.

We arrived at our destination much earlier than we anticipated, covering our 200 miles in four and one half hours. Being hospitably received by our fraternal friends we at once became victims of a foaming liquid. Not one of us seemed irritable of this gratitude but at once dug into the foam and all with the gusto of delight. Heat and the long trip made us very thirsty. Our plan of seeing the Falls in evening dress of white and colored lights was overruled by our friends who had arranged for a small gathering at which we discussed our personal relationship in this country and others who came from abroad spoke enthusiastically about their homeland sections, villages, churches, etc. etc. etc.

It never fails, as often as I have contacted people who were born on present soils of Yugoslavia, to bring about stories, tales and true, about happenings in their days and years in which they arrived here. To sit and just listen one can receive a vivid picture of life as it used to be lived by our folks before coming across to a land of gold and the hardship they went through after their arrival here in this country.

Let us leave at this point and continue on the journey of the following day that took us to the Falls. As expected it was an amazing spectacle to my friends who have for the first time seen with their naked eyes, the thundering drop of so large a body of water, as it had amazed me when I first laid my eyes upon it. We have been informed about tragic and successful attempts of men who wanted to become famous by going over the Falls in barrels and balls. This notion seemed to us all quite unreasonable and we joked about it. We could not see what purpose such an attempt would serve other than personal glory, if any. Our time was scarce. We spent but a limited time viewing the Falls from the island surrounded by these wonders and the rapids that sped over the rocky span into the valley below.

Written big in the local history is the name of Joseph Brant, or Thayendanegea, a Mohawk chief. We heard more about him when we visited Fort Niagara situated at the mouth of the Niagara River and Lake Ontario. This Fort was built by the French back in the 17th century. Many historical battles were fought at this point. The Fort being in possession of the British then the French again and British once more before the Americans took hold only to lose it shortly before regaining it and holding it to the present day. On near-by grounds are modern training camps for our soldiers who will be used for future "democratic" purposes. A picturesque contrast of past and future wars.

Fort Niagara has an interesting historical background. Reason for such great desire to possess this land and territory was fur trading advantageous which in the period was like gold or its equal of today. The Mohawk chief mentioned above was a prisoner for six months in a dungeon-like room in this Fort. He was a prisoner of the French. Another Indian went blind as prisoner due to complete darkness of the hole originally built as a powder storage room.

Back to Buffalo and business, then back on the highways that led us to Cleveland with hopes that some day again we will find opportunity, time and money to once more visit the beautiful surrounding of Niagara.

Spehek's Homer Wins 6 to 4

With a new lineup that will steady itself as the season progresses, the Spartans went out last Friday to take the game from the Serbians by a 6 to 4 score.

The Serbians opened in the first inning smashing in three runs for an early lead. But this only proved to be an incentive for the Spartans to really bear down. In the second inning the Spartans came back to score two runs. From then on it was nip and tuck until the fifth when the Spartans scored three more runs. Spehek hit a home run with Dietz on the bags. Barbic had scored on Dietz's line single.

In the sixth the Serbians came back with another run, their fourth and last. After holding their opponents down throughout the game, the Spartans almost lost it when there was only one out and a man on second and third. Here the pitching of Koenig stood out as a big factor showing the ability of the new pitching staff. The next two batters were victims of his fast ball. They struck out swinging thus pulling the Spartans out of a bad hole to win the game.

Chojnowski, the Serbian hurler was a little wild at first allowing six passes. Five came in the first four innings. He struck out seven and gave eight hits. Koenig did very well pulling the Spartans out of a number of tight pinches. He gave but 2 passes, a decidedly much better showing than in his last start. His fast offerings garnered him 11 victories via the strikeout route and was chalked up for 10 hits.

In an exhibition game with the A. B. C. Garage team last Tuesday, Locker, another of the Spartans hurling aces gave them but three hits. The Spartans won 6 to 1.

Incidentally the game with the Serbians was the third consecutive game where the Spartans ended with a final score of 6 runs.
