Socialno zavarovanje je gotova stvar, vprašanje je le, kakšno. Boj za socialno zavarovanje v državi, ki je trajal desetletja, je izvojevan. Zdej se vprašanja, kdaj pride socialno zavarovanje, vprašanje je, kakšno bo to socialno zavarovanje, ki pride v prihodnjem kapitalističnem tisku čitajočih, da se je Wall street arce ameriškega kapitalizma sprizjajnil z idejo socialnega zavarovanja, ko je spoznal, da ni več mogoče odvrniti. Kapitalistične organizacije so zadnje tedne prejele navodila, naj usmerijo svoj boj na to, da se zavarovanje čim manj odloži za delodajalce. Kapitalisti so se torej v glavni podali, toda delavcem ne bo nič koristilo, ako se kapitalisti posreči, da kongres naloži konec bremena socialnega zavarovanja delavcem na glavo. Novi kongres bo vzakom načrt socialnega zavarovanja prihodnje pomlad. Prva točka socialnega zavarovanja, ki bo na dnevnem redu kongresu, je zavarovanje zoper brezposelnost. Kasneje, v letu ali dveh, pride na vrsto starostno zavarovanje ali pokojnina onim, ki na stara leta ostanejo brez dohodkov; inkrat kasneje bodo dodali še zavarovanje zoper industrijske bolezni in poškodbe. Načrtov za brezposelnostno zavarovanje je cela kopica. Kateri bodo izbrali, je danes še neznan. Glede tega tudi Rooseveltova uradna družina še ni jasna. Roosevelt želi federalno državno skemo, "fifty-fifty", nekaj, kar naj sprejmejo vse države, zvezna vlada pa naj kontrolira in svetuje; med njegovi svetovalci pa bi videli povsem federalni zakon, tako da delodajalci ne bodo mogli bežati s svojimi tovarni iz države, ki dobi za nje vse zakon, v drugo državo, ki je imela milejšega. Pojavljajo se tudi sugestije za privatno zavarovanje te vrste. Vlada naj prepusti zavarovanje zoper brezposelnost privatnim korporacijam, podobnim zavarovalnim družbam za smrtnino in bolezenske ter poškodninske obveznosti. Delavci si lahko pomagajo, koliko bi bilo to zavarovanje vredno za nje. Sicer še ni nobenih poskusov za to stvar, ki pa nič gotovega, da se ne bi pojavili. Gotovo pa je, da prihaja zavarovanja zoper brezposelnost, ki bo kompromis, torej tipičen "newdealski" poskus, da vsem ustreženo, faktično pa ne bo ustreženo nikomur. Amerika potrebuje zelo liberalen zakon brezposelnostnega zavarovanja, ki mora biti obližnivo in enako za vso republiko. Če, kar bodo hoteli imeti zakon delavci. V tem oziru delavci ne poznajo skromnosti in bodo se zadovoljili s staro formulo, da je "vsaka delovna boljša kot nič."

Leonarda in svojo 17-letno nevesto Ruth Steinmetz v sobi hotela Knights of Columbus. Steinmetzova sta bila poročena pred dvema tednoma v Californiji in prišla sta v New York na medene tedne. V hotelu sta se seznanila z duhovnom, ki je bil kaplan v katoliškem zavodu za starce v Lawrencevillu, N. J. Kaplan je poznal nevesto še iz Los Angelesa; njeno deklško ime je bilo Piles in po veri je bila katoličanka, po poklicu je pa bila filmska igralka iz Hollywooda, kjer je bila znana pod imenom Mary Ruth Armstrong. Steinmetz, ki je bil po dvojnem umoru takoj aretiran, je povedal policiji, da so vsi trije proslavili sestanek in pijačo v njegovi hotelski sobi. On je bil prvi premagan od pijače in je legel v posteljo ter zadremal. Ko se je zbudil, ni bilo več njegove neveste in kaplana v sobi. Ne je iskal in našel oba v kaplanovi sobi. Kaplan je bil brez suknje in njegova žena je bila napol razgaljena: Vzel je revolver in ustrelil oba v prsi. To je njegova izpoved.

Steinmetz je tudi povedal, da je prišel v Ameriko leta 1929. Njegov oče je bil rabinec, toda on je kmalu po prihodu v Ameriko pustil judovsko vero in postal protestant. Vpisal se je v presbiterijski seminarji in se učil za pridigarja.

AMERIKA NA DNU RADI PROFITNEGA SISTEMA

Odkar imamo krizo, bi dežela lahko producirala za 287 milijard več dobrin kakor jih je, pravijo gospodarski izvedenci

New York. — (FP) — Če bi Amerika ne imela profitnega sistema, ampak bi njen gospodarski aparat, tak kot je, obratoval za zadostitev človeških potrebščin in drugih dobrin, bi v zadnjih petih letih ne trpela nobene krize. Vsakdo bi lahko živel v izobilju in nikogar bi ne mučila skrb, kaj bo jutri. Vsi bi bili preskrbljeni z vsem, kar človek danes potrebuje in Amerika producirala.

To je zaključek sedemmesečnega študija o narodnem gospodarstvu, katerega je pričela FERA (Federal Emergency Relief Administration). Študij je šel za tem, da se dožene koliko več bi bila Amerika lahko producirala v zadnjih petih letih, odkar imamo krizo, kakor je faktično producirala.

Zaključek raziskovalcev je, da ta suma znaša 287 milijard dolarjev. Ta vsota je tako ogromna kakor se je pred krizo cenilo vse narodno premoženje. V zadnjih letih bi ga bila Amerika lahko podvojila, če bi ne bilo "čaja". Ta "če" je profitni sistem, ki onemogočuje največje blagostanje ljudskih mas in jih peha v pomanjkanje.

Strokovnjaki, razni odlični ekonomski in statistiki, so preučili vsako industrijo, koliko bi lahko z obstoječo mašinerijo in znahjem producirala. Končna suma potencialnega povika znaša kakor prej omejeno—287 milijard več dobrin v zadnjih petih letih kakor se jih je faktično produciralo.

To bi znašalo toliko, da bi vsaka družina lahko imela pet tisoč letnih dohodkov, ne da bi se pri tem dotaknili premoženja ali pa dohodkov 8% "srečnih" družin, ki prejemale več ko pet tisoč dohodkov na leto.

Načisto tega pa je v deželi mizerija, absolutna mizerija za nad 17 milijonov oseb, ki so odvisne od reliefa in še veliko več milijonov živi na stradalni stopnici ali le malo višje. Ogromna večina prebivalstva pa se trese pred negotovostjo, ki je lastna vsem, v neki meri celo kapitalistom. Tudi ti niso sigurni svojega obstoja.

Preiskovalci zaključujejo, kar velja današnjim gospodarjem kot svarilo: "Ljudstvo je zmogni trpeti veliko pomanjkanje, če v resnici primanjkuje potrebščin, je pa zelo dvomljivo, če bo hotelo živeti v revščini samo vsled tega, ker se dobrin ne izplača producirati!"

Italija smatra Paveliča za političnega begunca

Zahteva Francije za izročitev je bila odklonjena na podlagi pogodbe iz leta 1879

Rim, 27. nov.—Zahteva Francije za izročitev dr. Anteja Paveliča in Evgena Kvaternika, ki se nahajata v Turinu, je bila včeraj odklonjena po Italiji na podlagi pogodbe s Francijo iz leta 1879, katerega zabranjuje izročitev političnih jetnikov. Italija trdi, da je Francija v zadnjih letih odrekla izročitev 42 italijanskih beguncev na temelju te pogodbe.

Zeneva, 27. nov.—Ogrski delegat pri Ligi narodov je včeraj zahteval, da mora dr. Edvard Beneš, čehoslovaški zunanji minister, odstopiti kot predsednik sveta Lige narodov, kadar pride jugoslovansko-ogrski sporna zadeva na dnevni red, kajti Čehoslovakija je zaveznica Jugoslavije. Tajništvo Lige narodov je kasneje izjavilo, da bo dr. Beneš prostovoljno odložil predsedništvo za časa razprave.

Učitelji zahtevajo odstop predsednika kolegija

Povod je dalo izobčenje 21 anti-fašističnih študentov iz mestne šole

New York.—Učiteljska unija je dekanu mestnega kolegija dr. Gottschallu poslala zahtevo za odsvolitev predsednika šole Fredericka B. Robinsona, ker ga smatra za nesposobnega za to odgovorno mesto.

Svojo zahtevo opira na provokativno in neopravičljivo izobčenje 21 anti-fašističnih študentov, ki so demonstrirali proti pogostitvi 350 Mussolinijevih dijakov po predsedniku Robinsonu. Italijanski diktator je poslal svoje fašistične dijake v Ameriko v propagandistične svrhe.

Dr. Robinson je odprl tem Mussolinijevim poslancem vrata mestnega kolegija na široko. In to kljub temu, da bi bil lahko vnaprej vedel, da bo s tem provociral proteste med domačimi dijaki. To se je res zgodilo. Ker je pa Robinson tudi kos diktatorja, je voditelje teh demonstracij enostavno vrzel iz šole.

Dr. Henry R. Linville, predsednik učiteljske unije, pravi v pismu dekanu Gottschallu, da bi bilo za šolo veliko bolje, če bi zletel dr. Robinson, ker situacija zahteva taktno osebo na čelu fakultete. Nobenih nemirov bi ne bilo, če bi bil predsednik demokratska oseba in dovolil popolno svobodo govora.

Ob priliki anti-fašističnih demonstracij so študentje zažgali na kampusu slamnatega moža z dvema glavama — Robinsonovo in Mussolinijevo.

V Georgiji je podjetnik prepovedal delavcem trgovati pri njihovi naklonjenem trgovcu

Atlanta, Ga.—Kako svobodni so delavci na jugu, pokazuje incident, ki se je dogodil v bližini tega mesta, v kompanijskem mestecu Fulton Bag and Cotton kompanije. Ta družba je svojim 1800 tekstilnim delavcem, ki večinoma žive v njenih hišah, prepovedala zahajati v trgovino H. C. Bradforda, ki se nahaja v bližini tovarne.

Ta bojkot je družba odredila, ker hoče ostati absoluten gospodar nad svojimi sužnji. H. C. Bradford je namreč naklonjen uniji in je od delavcev pobiral unijske prispevke, katere je nato izročil tajniku. In ko je družba to odkrila, je delavcem enostavno prepovedala, da ne sme nikdo izmed njih v to trgovino.

Zdaj bo imela sitnosti pa na drugi strani. Trgovec je proti družbi namreč vložil tožbo za \$50,000 odškodnine. Toži jo radi bojkota.

Dijaški izgredi v Evropi

Dunaj, 27. nov.—Včeraj so nemški dijaki napadli češke dijake na dunajski univerzi kot odmev na izgrede med češkimi in nemškimi dijaki v Pragi. Dunajska policija je hitro udušila nemire.

New York.—Iz krogov zavarovalnih družb (life insurance companies) poročajo, da bodo te družbe najbrž v splošnem "revampirale" cene svojih premij, ki jih zavarovalci plačujejo od smrtninskih in drugih zavarovalnih police. Cene bodo zvišane takoj po novem letu in veljale bodo za nove zavarovalce.

Ta akcija je potrebna, se glasi poročilo, ker po starih premijah je zelo padel dobiček zavarovalnih družb. Mnogo družb je že omejilo razna izplačila po starih določbah in po novem letu se ta reforma vsekakor raztegne na druge.

Nekatere večje družbe se še branijo zvišanja premij za nove police, nameravajo pa znižati dividende lastnikom police.

Californija bo ugovarjala Mooneyjevemu prizivu

Na vidiku je daljši boj pred vrhovnim sodiščem o slovitnem delavskem jetniku

San Francisco. — (FP) — Državni justični tajnik U. S. Webb je naznanil, da bo do določenega dne vložil v imenu Californije ugovor pred zveznim vrhovnim sodiščem proti Mooneyjevemu prizivu za oprostitev iz ječe. V zaporu je že nad 18 let radi omreženja.

Edine besede, ki jih je Mooney spregovoril, ko je bil obveščen, da je bil njegov priziv sprejet po vrhovnem sodišču, so bile: "To je vesela novica. Upam, da se bo vse skupaj končalo zadovoljivo." Državni justični tajnik Webb pa ni hotel dati nobenega komentarja; le naznanil je, da bo vložil ugovor.

Kaj bo vrhovno sodišče napravilo in-spolh kako se razvije nadaljnja bitka za osvobodjenje Mooneyja in odnosno tudi Billingsa, je stvar ugibanja. Zmaga sigurno še ni dobljena.

Vrhovno sodišče bo lahko potrdilo Webbov ugovor in končalo zadevo. Lahko ga bo tudi našlo nezadovoljivega ter odredilo zaslisanje Mooneyja v Washingtonu. Prav lahko tudi odredi proceduro "habeas corpus" za nadaljnje zaslisanje po sodišču ali pa novo obravnavo. Končno pa lahko intervenirajo na njegovi ali pa na državni strani "prijatelji sodišča", kar se bo skoraj gotovo zgodilo in sodnijski boj se bo nadaljeval.

Kadar gre za oprostitev kakega milijonarja, če slučajno pride v ječo, kar se kakor znano redko zgodi, tedaj procedura ni tako komplicirana. Pot, ki vodi na svobodo, je hitro najdena. Toda Mooney ni milijonar, ampak je militanten delavski organizator, vsled česar sedi v ječi že od leta 1916. "Justice" je bila na njegovi strani le toliko, da je bil od smrtne obsodbe pomiloščen v dosmrtno ječo za zločin, katerega ni storil.

NEOZDRAVLJIVE SO OZDRAVILI

Pravkar so razdelili Nobelovo nagrado za medicino za 1934 leto. Prisolili so jo trem ameriškim zdravnikom, ki so odkrili v jetrih zdravilo zoper zločestno malokrvnost.

Zločestna malokrvnost je bila vse do nedavnih let strahotna bolezen, ki se ni dala v nobenem primeru ozdraviti in le redko se je posrečilo zdravnikom podaljšati življenje takim bednim bolnikom. Ta malokrvnost ni kakšna redka bolezen kakor na primer gobavost, temveč napade prav pogosto moške in ženske navadno v starosti 40 do 60 let. Bolniki postanejo bledikavi, lahko utrudljivi in apatični. Sčasoma postane koža kakor vosk blede, sluznice se komaj ločijo od ostale kože. Cim napreduje bolezen, pričnejo bolniki otekati. Trdovratna zaprtja, bljuvanja in driske se vrstijo druga za drugo. Pri stalni vročici ginejo bolnikom skoraj vidno moči, dokler jih smrt po treh do dvanajstih mesecih ne reši trpljenja.

Natančen zdravniški pregled nam pokaže, da se pri tej bolezni številno rdečih krvnih telescev naglo manjša. Nazadnje je teh že tako malo, da ne morejo več vzdržavati življenja v telesu. O vzrokih te strahotne neozdravljive bolezni so že mnogo razmišljali. Nekateri so sodili, da so tukaj usodne velike izgube krvi, kakor se to dogaja pri žledčnih čirih in raznih ženskih boleznih. Drugi so dolžili nekatero nalezljivo bolezen kakor sifilis, grižo in malarijo. Drugi spet so iskali povzročitelje zločestne malokrvnosti v raznih črevesnih parazitih (parazitih). Danes sodi večina najodličnejših poznavalcev te bolezni, da imajo pri njenem nastanku važno vlogo motnje v delovanju nekkih žlez z notranjim izločevanjem (pomanjkanje hormonov).

V letu 1926 so stopili trije ameriški raziskovalci, zdravniki Minot, Murphy in Whipple, ki so dobili letos Nobelovo nagrado, pred javnost s trditvijo, da se jim je posrečilo ozdraviti perniciozno anemijo (zločestno malo-

krvnost) s čudovito enostavnim sredstvom: z jeterno dieto. Skrajša so dajali pojesti bolnikom četrt kilograma jeter. Tako so dosegli prav presenetljive uspehe. Lica bolnikov so pričela spet rdeči, število rdečih krvnih telescev se je naglo večalo, moči so se boljšale. Bolniki, čez katere so napravili drugi zdravniki že davno križ, so vatali s postelj in se vrnili v svoje poklice.

Ko je prišla vest o teh ozdravitvah v javnost, so učeni zdravniki vsega sveta zaničljivo zmajevali za glavami, češ, to je spet prava ameriška potegavčina. Seže z velikim trudom se je v zadnjih letih posrečilo pripraviti zdravilke o važnosti tega ameriškega odkritja, ko se je pokazalo, da je trditve teh treh Američanov povsem resnična. Tako se je posrečilo odkritje, ki je moramo prištevati med največje uspehe zdravniške znanosti, pri čemer je prav zanimiva okolnost, da se je posrečilo ozdraviti bolezen, o čije vzrokih prav malo vemo, ki pa jo ozdravimo s takim sredstvom, o čigar učinku in delovanju tako malo vemo. Za bolnika samega je seveda to znanstveno vprašanje prav male važnosti, saj je zanj zadnje glavno le dejstvo ozdravitve.

Od odkritja ameriških učenjakov pa do danes je zdravniška veda neumorno delala, raziskovala ter izpopolnjevala nov način zdravljenja perniciozne anemije. Tako se je posrečilo zdravljenje prav izdatno izboljšati. Danes se že ne daje bolnikom vedno le jetra jesti, te se namreč bolniku kaj kmalu ustavi, temveč zdravijo danes to hudo bolezen z izvlečki iz jeter, želodca in črev. Znani dunajski profesor zdravilstva Pal trdi celo, da je našel in izločil iz teh izvlečkov dvoje snovi, ki ju že davno poznamo. Tisti sredstvi, ki povzročata ozdravitev sta cholin in hystamin. Če je njegovo odkritje resnično, se smemo nadejati, da ne bo treba več mučiti bolnikov z zopernimi jetrami, temveč bo mogoče zdraviti zločestno malokrvnost kakor druge bolezni s prav enostavnimi vtrčavani zdravili. — o — č.

Campaign Comments

Unless the Administrative Committee decides otherwise, the national jubilee membership campaign is on its final stretch. It is entering its tenth and final month on Dec. 1, destined to conclude its successful work on Dec. 31.

The net gain of 2688 new adult and juvenile members procured during the first eight months of the campaign warrants ample optimism that the last two months will easily bring in a sufficient number of new members to surpass the set goal of "3,000 new members during the campaign."

Our jubilee campaign officially opened March 1, last, and will close December 31, 1934. New members accepted during the dates specified are entitled to all privileges of the campaign and the workers and proposers to the awards as announced by the Supreme Board at its yearly meeting held in February of this year.

In addition to the specified amounts given to the proposers, members of the juvenile department who enter during the campaign are exempt from payment of two monthly assessments, and the organization is paying the expense of the medical examination up to the amount of 50c.

Repetitions are necessary. So we repeat that the Society is paying \$1 for each new member, between the age of 16 and 35 years, and accepted during the drive. The branches and individuals participating in the campaign, in addition to the specified cash awards, will receive \$10 in cash for 25 or more new members procured.

It was further announced at the beginning of the campaign that the SNPJ will pay the expense of the medical examination for every new adult member up to the sum of \$2 and exempt him from payment of \$1 initiation fee for the building fund.

It is now quite evident that the sentiment of the younger members expressed in these columns is strongly for a continuance of the campaign. In view of its present success the campaign should be extended for a period of at least six months, as this would give our E. S. branches an added opportunity to increase their folds.

It has been repeatedly stressed during our anniversary year that we can commemorate the 30th anniversary of the Slovene National Benefit Society best by securing the greatest possible number of new adult and juvenile members. Many of our faithful members and branches have answered the call most remarkably and enthusiastically. Their united efforts will be crowned by the final success.

How General Dawes "Served His Country"

Apparently General Charles G. Dawes, familiarly known as "Hell 'n Maria," has "gypped Uncle Sam to the tune of \$60,000,000." The General was hailed as one of the nation's "best minds"—an outstanding figure in business, finance and politics. He was chief of the budget, Ambassador to the Court of James, and Vice President of the United States. In 1928 he was a serious candidate for Presidency.

During the closing months of the Hoover administration Dawes quit the diplomatic service and came home to "serve his country" as chief of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. In the summer of 1932 he resigned that job, and a few days later returned to Washington to borrow \$80,000,000 from RFC. That transaction was put over at a time when President Hoover was refusing to appropriate a penny to feed the army of hungry idlers.

In defense of the Dawes loan the public was assured that ample security had been deposited with the RFC. The falsity of that claim is now revealed, and Federal authorities are lining up the stockholders of the old Dawes bank \$60,000,000 still unpaid.

Apparently Dawes was permitted to give RFC paper of questionable value while he organized a new bank to do business at another stand.

There is nothing particularly surprising about this transaction. This is the same Dawes who many years ago enabled the notorious "Billy" Lorimer to open a bank in Chicago by placing in Lorimer's hands a large sum of money which Lorimer represented to the bank examiners as the property of his institution. After the bank examiners left the money was returned to Dawes and not so long after that Lorimer's bank "folded up," sweeping away the savings of thousands of small depositors.

In the face of the Lorimer transaction Dawes was placed in charge of Uncle Sam's strong-box by Hoover, and naturally he helped himself.—Labor!

Let Labor Be Wary

For the past ten days the daily press has been filled with happy bulletins from the United States Chamber of Commerce to the effect that industry and big business in general is going to cooperate 100% with President Roosevelt in his recovery program. The late industrial organization to follow suit is the National Association of Manufacturers, one of the most militant anti-Labor groups in the nation.

When the daily press begins to sign pages of praise for President Roosevelt's program Labor can well beware. Labor has every right to suspect that there is a nigger in the woodpile when the American Bankers' association, the U. S. Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers begin to flood the nation with prosperity talk. For the past twelve months they have been doing just the very opposite.

Some indication of what is in store for the nation came out of the national convention of the American Bankers' association less than three weeks ago. This convention condemned practically every relief measure President Roosevelt has advocated or put into effect. It condemned the national administration for its snooping about banks, bankers and trust companies. It called down the wrath of high heaven on congress for its enactment of a securities law. It warned the nation against socialistic experiments being conducted under federal patronage.

In the midst of these carpings President Roosevelt addressed the convention and assured the money changers they had nothing to fear from him. As a result the bankers went home and spent hundreds of thousands of dollars in advertising space to inform the world that the bankers were going to assist industry to put men to work.

Now the U. S. Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers are doing the same thing. Naturally, Labor has the right to wonder what concessions the President has made to secure the support of the two outstanding enemies of organized Labor. Has President agreed to "forget" section 7-a of the national industrial recovery act? Has he agreed to let the NRA—with its guarantees of collective bargaining—die a natural death when the emergency relief laws expire in 1935?

Just what has occasioned all this talk of prosperity and cooperation on the eve of the convening of congress?—Min. Union Advocate

For wage earners particularly, these facilities must be provided for by themselves, and at their own cost. With this in mind one would look at the Waukegan situation, where this formula is illogical in expression with respect and if he were a home owner with mingled feelings of satisfaction for the locality, that is, where the people who may suffer through this article live, is alive, young people are studying, planning and doing as well what may become very important things in their lives, and I repeat, it is not because of an "embarassed rebuff" but just plain determination through working class organization.

Dual Union in the Anthracite

Wilkes-Barre, Pa.—A new union, called United Anthracite Miners of Penna., organized about a year ago, thru the direct initiative of ex-president of Dist. 1, UMWA, Rinaldo Cappellini, and with support of some expelled members, is under fire and definite decline. This was shown by the recent convention held in Wilkes-Barre. It was called because of the rising dissatisfaction against the conditions imposed upon members of their Union as result of non-recognition by the large coal operators. Before convention came into session, leaders of this Union didn't waste any time, they kept telegrams and trains busy riding back and forth to Washington expecting support by the Washington politicians and their Labor Board. Out of which nothing good came for the rank and file miners. This, however, didn't prevent leaders of the Union to cool off fighting sentiment and to maneuver it to postpone any action that would result in a strike, for one week, during this time officials of the Union further maneuvered and negotiated with Washington and in the same time lay peace propositions before the officials of the old Union (UMWA) which include election in Union to be supervised by two men from each Union and Governor Pinchot to be the fifth man as arbitrator. The election to be so arranged that a ballot would have on one side Maloney and its Executive Board and on the other Old Union with Boylan and its Executive Board.

When the week elapsed delegates reconvened. At this time delegates learned that officials of old Union refuse to receive mail from the mailman that consists of the so-called peace proposals, and nothing came forth from the Washington politicians. Discussion took place of what would be the best policy to fight for recognition of their Union. Many delegates in discussion were pressing upon Executive Board for their stand, which they failed to give until the exhaustion of the delegates, and at the very end. In an old bureaucratic Lewis way, organizers were stationed in the hall and opened fire on those delegates that were pressing for the Executive Board stand. Finally, Pres. Maloney got up and outlined his stand which is: "We can't get Washington authority on our side because we can't show them credentials from our local secretaries." Which in other words means that the New Union doesn't have the majority.

Maloney continued: "We couldn't stay long enough in Washington to influence some men because we don't have money. Our Local officials divided the money among themselves right after the collection of the dues." He further said: "I have three propositions: 1. To seek remedy and recognition from Pres. Roosevelt; 2. To engage an attorney to take miners' grievances against companies thru the civil court; and, 3rd, if we fail in this then we will strike. But I wouldn't authorize strike against companies that give us recognition."

Sec'y. Shuster repeated the same statement, which was approved and the convention was adjourned. A week after the convention, strike was called in the Nanticoke territory by locals of the Susquehanna Collieries and Glen Alden because Susquehanna Collieries thru the pressure of the old Union discharged 6 men who began to organize New Union. The strike lasted for two days. When general Grievance Committee was called together by Maloney, the strike was called off, on the same plan that grievance be taken up by an attorney in the court. During these two days of strike it was evident what the Dual Union would lead to. New Union organized all their forces available to picket and shut down 2 Susquehanna collieries where they had a very small minority. Old Union also organized all official staff of the Dist. to lead and fight, to go to work thru pickets. The fight was bitter and many were injured from both Unions.

It was evident that grievance against the company was forgotten and the fight was among the miners themselves. The New Union used their picketing forces from Glen Alden operations where they closed half of Glen Alden colliery. After the two-day strike, a meeting of general mine committee of the new Union was called for the purpose of calling all Glen Alden operation on sympathy strike to Susquehanna Comp. Again the leaders maneuvered and called the strike off. Grievances are now given into an attorney's hands and taken to civil court.

Now the question is, When will the anthracite miners realize that they can't gain anything thru Dual Union, and that leadership of the New Union is not capable to foresee the route for betterment of the miners? After exhausting all their maneuvers with different politicians and traitors of workers, they are going to send miners' grievances to the court whose judges confessed themselves that they are stockholders of the Coal companies. We say the sooner the miners will realize, and in an organized manner return back where the main body of miners are, the better it will be for the miners as a whole. When the proposal for peace was before the miners, like anything else, it was not properly grasped by the leaders of the New Union.

I agree that it was not the best peace proposal. But instead, the way Maloney proposed, to have on one side of the ballot New Union and its Ex. Board and on the other Boylan and his Ex. Board. If they would say, "Yes, we accept the peace pro-

posals," and go back to old Union. Give us election, that would be supervised by the rank and file miners of both Unions, which will give a chance to the rank and file to run a man for union offices, that would work for the best interests of the miners. Such was the possibility that existed within the ranks of the Old Union. But it was overlooked by our friends, the Progressives, few Socialists, and even Communists, who are not tired to preach "United Front" and rank and file control, but don't know how to put it into effect and practice.

Such an opportunity as I mentioned above doesn't exist now, as far as the District is concerned. Because the New Union exposed itself as weakening. But it is not too late yet for Local Unions, in organized manner, to apply for reinstatement, and for a rank and file election in their respective locals. When you get this, then prepare for the district elections as an opposition within the Union.

We realize the difficult work within the UMWA under the leadership of John L. Lewis. But it is for the best interest of all miners. The fault of the Union lies right at your local Union. Corrupt local Union officials make up corrupt Dist. officials and then International. One Union for All Miners. Begin cleaning house from your respective locals and up. F. Vratarić, Lodge 204.
