Vseslovanski kongres v Detroitu

Detroit, Mich. — Obveščamo gl. odbor SNPJ, naša društva in vso našo javnost, da je bil 15. marca na vseslovanski konferenci države Michigan izvoljen odbor po zastopnikih Slovencev, Hrvatov in Srbov. V tem odboru je devet oseb, po tri od vsake narodnosti, njihova naloga pa je, da agitirajo med ameriški Slovenci, Hrvati in Srbi ter njihovih organizacijah za prihajajoči vseslovanski kongres.

Ker je centralni odbor za pripravljanje vseslovanskega kongresa pred več ko enim mesecem zaključil, da se kongres vrši 25. in 26. aprila v Detroitu, Mich., smo na omenjeni konferenci razpravljali, kako dobiti čim več delegatov slovenskih, hrvaških in srbskih organizacij na kongres.

Težka, mučna in trnjeva so dela in pota za obdržanje pevskih zborov. In ta dela opravljajo večinoma zmiraj ene in iste osebe. Posebno pa je težko zbor obdržati, ako isti nima zaslonbe od strani krajevnega občinstva, ali hrbtenice od kakega društva ali kluba.

Zbor Svoboda se je leta 1917 porodil iz članov kluba št. 114 JSZ in ta klub je bil zborova hrbtenica. Ako bi ne bilo te hrbtenice, dvomim, da bi zbor danes slavil srebrni jubilej. Hrbtenica pevskega zbora Zarje v Clevelandu je pa ves čas soc. klub št. 27 JSZ.

Petje in godbo sem ljubil od rane mladosti. Ko sem bil stár 14 let, sem pristopil k mestni godbi. Čitalničarji (sami škrieci) so imeli pevski oktet, katerega je vodil nadučitelj Fr. Šetina. S tem se je podučitelj R. Schiller nekaj spril, odstopil od omenjenega okteta, zbral skupaj nas navadne fante ter ustanovil pevski zbor z 22 pevci. Učil nas je tudi igre in pri dveh igrah sem imel tudi jaz vloge. Ta zbor ni imel nobene hrbtenice in je v par letih umrl. Godba, katere hrbtenica je mesteca Črnomelj, še danes eksistira, če se ne motim.

Veliko pevskih zborov je že prenehalo, ker niso imeli hrbtenice niti zaslonbe od krajevnega občinstva. Občinstvo se vse premalo zaveda, kako koristni so pevski zbori po naselbinah. Nekateri nevedneži celo žele, da isti izginejo čim prej s površja.

Bil sem tudi član pevskega zbora in dramatičnega kluba na bakrenem okrožju v Calumetu z imenom Slovenija. Član in tajnik omenjenega kluba je bil tudi sedanjí urednik Prosvete br. Molek. Leta 1906 smo prirredili v hosti privatni piknik, in slika istega je priobčena v Družinskem koledarju, letnik 1940. Na tej sliki v tretji vrsti prvi stoječ od desne proti levi je Ivan Molek.

Pri omenjenem dramakem klubu in pevskem zboru je prevladovala pobožna struja. Večkrat smo prirredili kakšno igro ali koncert v prid cerkve. Ko je pa prišel za rev. Pakizem za župnika rev. L. Klopčič, je dobil pobožno grupo na svojo struno in prirejali so igre in koncerte zmiraj samo za cerkev. Napredna struja se je tega naveličala, nastal je v klubu in zboru kavs in se vse skupaj raztrgalo in propadlo. Tega, kot že omenjeno, je bil kriv pokojni rev. Klopčič. Marsikateri pevski zbor bo v sedanjí vojni izginit s površja. Kajti vojna pobira mlade moči, stari so se pa utrudili, da si nekateri veliko prezgodaj.

trebovala nujne pomoči.To je prvi odbor ameriških Slovencev, ki stoji nad vsemi stran-
kami in vsemi naziranj; to je naš prvi odbor, čigar edini program
in naloga sta humanitarnost in s katerim lahko sodeluje vsako,
ki je toliko širokogrudna in demokratična, da mu lahko zaupa.Naš Jugoslovanski pomožni odbor (slovenska sekcija) je torej

ameriških Slovencev namenoma nagajiva ali celo nasprotna po-

The Importance of Our Juvenile Groups

It is readily admitted that the Juvenile Department of the SNPJ is one of its most valuable assets, both as a present as well as the future source of new adult membership.

In fact, our Juvenile Department is regarded as second in importance only to the Adult Department, the former numbering 15,000 and the latter approximately 45,500 members, counting the 2000 juveniles and 5358 adults that were brought in by the SNPJ-SSPZ merger of last fall.

Our Juvenile Department was established by the fifth regular convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in 1912, and as such it is a pioneer in its field. The department began functioning the following year, in 1913, and therefore, will be 30 years old next year. This means that another important anniversary is in the offing which merits official observance.

At the time of the establishment of the Juvenile Department, the SNPJ was but eight years old, with 188 branches and 9,090 members. The juvenile institution proved an immediate success and the growth of our Society was rapid.

During the first ten years of its existence, the department helped considerably in the growth of the Adult Department. However, the real wisdom of such a department was proved during the past twenty years, since the immigration restrictions came into effect and our fraternal have had to rely for their growth almost exclusively on the second and third generation of our people in this country.

Today our Juvenile Department remains the main source from which to draw new adult members. Therefore, it is particularly important that all active members in the current Victory Campaign bring in all eligible children as well as all potential adult members.

The above facts lead to our Juvenile Circles which, as the name denotes, are composed of our juvenile members and have been established to promote interest in our Society among the juveniles and to instill in them the principles of the SNPJ.

The Juvenile Circles of the SNPJ were established by the tenth regular convention in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1937, and began functioning the following year. The first units were organized in Colorado, Cleveland and Pennsylvania.

According to the official roster published in Mladinski List for December of last year, there were about 30 Juvenile Circles in existence, actively engaged in the work assigned to them.

At the time of the merger last fall, the SSPZ also had about 30 juvenile groups named "Vrtci" in its fold. These were established several years before the SNPJ juvenile groups were formed. It is reported that in some cases they achieved notable progress and a special monthly supplement to the official weekly of the SSPZ was published for their enjoyment and encouragement, which in their case served them as our Mladinski List serves our juveniles.

Now the two juvenile groups have been united under the SNPJ-SSPZ merger which has been in effect for the past few months. According to the latest official roster published in Mladinski List for April, the total number of Juvenile Circles has been forty-two; the actual number, however, is 33 because nine of the Circles are not listed. We are informed that about seven juvenile groups of the former SSPZ have merged with the Circles.

We all agree that our Juvenile Circles could play a vital role in the SNPJ and we must be alert enough to translate this idea into actuality. The relation of the Circles to our Society has been manifested repeatedly in a number of instances.

We all know that the youngsters are eager and willing to cooperate, but we should also know that the results are always in direct proportion to the efforts expended. It is necessary that the ties between the lodges and circles become genuinely strong; and in order to achieve this, the lodges must furnish capable leadership as a first prerequisite for ultimate success.

At this time especially, during the present Victory Campaign, all of our ESL's in particular are called upon to build up strong juvenile units. Nothing will enhance the interest of the youngsters in the SNPJ more than participation in their own groups!

Important Instructions and Explanations

New and improved monthly reports for both the Adult and Juvenile Departments will be issued in April and sent to the secretaries of the local lodges. On these reports all members of the individual lodges, as reported to us, shall be listed. Special attention is called, however, to all the members of the former SSPZ who were paying their monthly assessments up to and including the month of March to the secretaries of the former SSPZ, despite the fact that they may have belonged to an SNPJ lodge, that after April 1st, assessment should be paid only to the secretary of the lodge where they now actually belong.

Local lodge secretaries of the former SSPZ are requested to send assessment after April 1st to the Headquarters on the new monthly reports, and you should discontinue to use the monthly forms of the former SSPZ. If any local lodge secretary notices on the monthly reports, either Adult or Juvenile, any error whatsoever, he should immediately report same to the Supreme Office.

Those members who before the merger belonged to both organizations, that is, SNPJ and SSPZ, shall receive a credit on over-paid assessment from January 1st up to the date when the new monthly report becomes effective. The local lodge secretaries have already received a report on individual members and how much credit they are entitled to.

Members of the former SSPZ are listed on the monthly reports according to the Questionnaire recently received from the local lodge secretaries. If any member who is listed on the monthly report desires to transfer to another lodge, it is suggested that he should pay his assessment for the month of April to the secretary of the lodge where he now belongs, and then ask for a transfer card.

Members of the former SSPZ who, according to the merger agreement, are entitled to reimbursement of certain percentage of assessment in the mortuary fund shall receive that reimbursement just as soon as we have time to make the necessary calculations.

The local lodge secretaries and members in general are asked to comply with the foregoing instructions and explanations.

Pop, who is well known even among distant friends, will be a happy person, and the gang will celebrate.

Even though we can boast of a membership of about 270 for this small town of ours, it is no good reason why we can't contribute substantially to the present SNPJ Victory Campaign. The secretary reports that he is certain to earn himself a victory bond, and other reports heard indicate that we should increase our membership this year by at least 25. We have

stated reasons that point the way to approach that number.

Lest We Forget

National attention has been focused for several weeks past on the Federal Wage and Hour Law, particularly as regards the 40-hour week and the time and one-half feature. Debates on the subject appear almost everywhere, and, fortunately for SNPJ members, they have found their way into the columns of our organ. Our opinion follows.

In considering this subject, it becomes necessary to demarcate between double time for Sundays and holidays as established in a few industries, and the 40-hour week time and one-half feature. The former is an agreement between labor and management; the latter is on the statute books of our Federal government.

Our capitalist economy essentially divides society into two distinct classes; namely, the owning class and the wage earning class, the employer and the employee, or the class that lives because owning and the class that lives because working. Their interests in our modern industrial society are as different as day and night. Any labor legislation beneficial to one class is of necessity harmful to the other. It is this fundamental difference in society that is responsible for the current dispute over the wage-hour law which has been profitable to the worker and injurious to capital. That the provisions of the law are impeding war production is a disguise for capital to repeal a law which it doesn't like.

There is an organized attempt by anti-labor leaders in Washington, inspired by organized capital, to confuse and mislead us on this controversy. They feel that the time is now ripe to defeat all that labor has gained within recent years, and the wage-hour law is vitally important. They fear a spread of the New Deal after the war throughout the world; and they are organizing not only to prevent that, but to destroy what the New Deal has symbolized in the U. S. A. They fear that the various difficulties and dislocations caused by this war will lead to radical readjustments following the war.

Every support must be given to challenge and frustrate their efforts. We must not yield to the repeal of a law that has done so much to relieve unemployment and increase payrolls, and whose extension will mean more of the better things of life. As wage earners, this must be our position, for submitting will prove tragic. (Continued on page 4)

This Week

With the belated arrival of spring, many important things are on the horizon at home as well as on the battlefield. While the task at home is comparatively easy, it is not so on the battlefield.

For instance, the eastern front is now by far the most important of all war fronts. The time is at hand when the struggle on the Russian front will assume titanic proportions as the opposing armies of millions will try to gain supremacy.

This week Lord Beaverbrook, British lend-lease coordinator speaking in a broadcast to Canada, pointed out the Russian front as the one on which the hopes of the Allies are centered, and urged that all possible supplies be sent to this most critical battlefield in the history of civilization.

"We recognize the opportunity presented by the epic battle of the Russians," Beaverbrook said. He stated that if the Russian armies were scattered beyond the Urals, then all our hopes would be scattered too. Because Nazi Germany would then "possess the sinews to fight a war that would be long indeed, and because Japan would set new and distant horizons."

The speaker said that after suffering "all the vexations of defeat and retreat, the cry goes up for offensive action. Action! This is the proper mood for great nations who are resolved to remain great. And it is in this mood that we recognize the debt we owe to Russia."

Beaverbrook went on and said that unless we have resolute, determined, brave citizens, trained to handle the guns and tanks, ships and planes, then we cannot be the makers. "Singapore was not lost to superior equipment; on the contrary, the weight of munitions was on our side. Crete was taken by surprise, by decoy, and by swift movement," concluded Beaverbrook.

Speaking of equipment and supplies, we can be sure that labor in America will produce all that is necessary. In fact, the American workers are doing a remarkably good job, the labor-haters notwithstanding. But, according to Beaverbrook who speaks from stark experience, "the job cannot be finished in the factories. It must be done in the field."

News From the Victory Campaign Front

The SNPJ VICTORY CAMPAIGN continues to grow more and more successful and attractive as each week's results are posted on the roll of honor. This week the Campaign Director reports the addition of 10 more members and 9 lodges to the official roster of contestants, bringing the total number of those who have pledged and qualified themselves to HELP DEFEND AMERICA BY ENROLLING NEW MEMBERS IN THE SNPJ to 34 individual contestants and 25 lodges. This, you are reminded, is by no means a complete record of lodges and individuals who have enrolled new members during the opening month of the Victory Campaign, but of those lodges only who are represented by one or more contestants. His entry along with two membership applications qualified him as a Victory Contestant. Brother Maglich is one of our new Supreme Board members who packs a load of sincerity, conviction, courage and good sense into every speech he makes. We know he has the "stuff" to carry out his assignments in a manner that will be a credit to every lodge and contestant in his District and, of course, to the Society as a whole. Although, Brothers Maglich and John Spiller are the only two of the six Vice-Presidents who have had their names announced as contestants, this does not mean, nor do we wish to have anyone interpret it as such, that our remaining District Vice-Presidents are not busy in their respective localities, for they are and the reports and results published later will bear out this statement.

MARY JANESHEK, who has the distinction of being one of our active and most capable Juvenile Circle leaders, has pledged her support to the Victory Campaign and makes this decision binding with three new members. Sister Janeshek is a member of Lodge 89, Midway, Pa., a next-door neighbor to the Lucky Star Lodge of Imperial. The proposed elimination of the forty hour week is but another attack on Labor by those who have for years countenanced hate and despair for any Labor advancement in the social or political field. Personally, we feel that recent legislation attempting to establish a straight time week was not an original thought by our Congressmen. Workers are using their few extra dollars to advantage, don't worry. Through the payroll plan, the majority have authorized deductions for DEFENSE BONDS and these deductions are for good sized amounts. There has been unreasonable and unexcusable price rises in all branches of merchandising and without the opportunity of working a few hours longer a week, at a time and a half rate, the purchase of Defense Bonds would be but a vision.
