V torek smo objavili po tukajšnjih ameriških časopisih posneto vest, da je zborovalo v New Yorku nad tisoč protestantovskih škofov, nižjih duhovnikov, vzgojiteljev in profesorjev iz vse dežele, ki so podpisali ter poslali predsedniku Rooseveltu petico, v kateri ga rotili, naj pospeši Rusiji v njenem gigantskem boju proti Hitlerju vso potrebno pomoč, za katero so podpisanci pripravljali, doprinesiti vse potrebne žrtve. "Sedanja groza in obup se izražata v svetovnem fašizmu, čigar politična in vojaška fronta je kombinacija ošiča, proti kateremu je tvorilo našo obrambo špansko in kitajsko ljudstvo, zdaj pa jo tvorita angleško in rusko ljudstvo. Mi se pridružujemo anglikanski in ruski pravoslavni cerkvi v molitvah za ljudstvo Rusije, za sovjetsko armado in za sovjetske voditelje."

"Mi ne smemo čakati na blagodeť fašizma. Svoboda mora preiti v napad. Za svobodo so se postavili v Madridu, v Čunkingu, v Londonu in Leningradu; toda vse to še ni dovolj. Svoboda se mora opasati za pohod!"

Ali ni to topla, humana in demokratična izjava protestantovske duhovščine, ki se je v vseh teh blodnjah internacionalnega fašizma in njegovega bestialnega terorizma izkazala kot iskrena pobornica človeških pravic, človeške demokracije in svobode?

Pred dnevi pa smo po istih virih objavili tudi neko drugo vest, namreč dejstvo, da se je katoliška duhovščina Amerike izjavila skoraj 100-procentno proti dajtvam ameriške pomoči Rusiji!

Danes je vsakemu idijotu jasno, da je Rusija prva obrambna črta svetovne demokracije in poglaviti jez, ob katerega buta valovje pošastnega nacizma, ki je zaslužil že domala vso Evropo. Kako se godi nesrečnim narodom, ki jih tišči k tlom težak nacijski škorenj, nazorno dokazujejo poleg ostalih, zlasti slovanske države — Poljska, Češka in Jugoslavija, kjer ubijejo nacisti za vsakega ubitega nemškega vojaka 100 Srbov. Kakšnemu neznošemu trpljenju, preseljevanju in iztrebljanju je izpostavljeno naše ljudstvo v domovini, vemo iz vesti svetovnega časopisa kakor tudi iz pisem, ki jih prejemo naši rojaki od svojcev, ki ne lažejo! Vse to pa ne gane katoliške duhovščine, sicer ne bi tako trdovratno vztrajala na svojem nehumanem, nedemokratičnem in antiljudskem stališču, na katerem stoji vse od zločinov španskega fašizma nad španskim delavskim in kmečkim ljudstvom, pa do današnjega položaja v Rusiji. Canterburyški nadškof anglikanske cerkve je baš v sredo rotil angleško vlado, naj pošlje svojo armado Rusiji na pomoč, češ: z Rusijo pade vse ostali svet pod nacijsko nadvlado! — Katoliška duhovščina pa zasleduje slej ko prej svoje lastne interese, ki pa niso interesi ljudstva, niti ne interesi velikih, človekoljubnih državnikov, ki si prizadevajo ohraniti človeštvu demokracijo in svobodo.

Jugoslovanski viri iz Londona poročajo, da si Italija in Nemčija prizadevata uvesti v Jugoslaviji med Srbi in Hrvati ter Bosanci in Hercegovci "kampanjo sovražstva", pri čemer se Italijani in Nemci poslužujejo pomoči katoliških duhovnikov, kakor naznanja "New York Times" z dne 22. oktobra. Zakaj je katoliška duhovščina pripravljena, služiti kot orodje razbojnikom, najhujšim sovražnikom svojega lastnega ljudstva?!

Pa saj po tozadavne zglede nam ni treba segati v Evropo, ker jih imamo med seboj več kot dovolj. Coughlin, Firis, James M. Gillis, Charles M. Houser et Co., sami "vodvisneži", "first-comitarji" in "krščanski frontarji,"

land Metropolitan Housing Authority, with the financial assistance of the United States Housing Authority, has built and is operating two additional estates. Several others are now in various stages of completion. The Cleveland Authority was the first to be organized of the 624 in the United States, under the first of the 39 state housing laws.

The story of public housing is graphically told by means of modern photography and models at this exhibit. Valleyview Homes and Woodhill Homes are interestingly built in miniature. The exhibition is non-political and unbiased in content and approach; it includes a newly prepared section on Defense Housing. Emphasis in the exhibit is placed upon the outstanding Cleveland developments.

Considered as a whole, Cleveland's public housing is the most important building operation undertaken in Greater Cleveland in the past twenty years, and has done the most to improve and beautify the city.

Housing here has contributed to the progress of art in Cleveland for many young and talented artists have had an opportunity to add to the lasting beauty of the community and to gain valuable experience, in executing the murals, paintings, handcraft, ceramic decorations and sculpture which have been built into the several housing developments.

Public housing in Cleveland is a success, thanks to an informed and intelligent public and to the fine leadership of its housing officials. The selfless services rendered by the unpaid members of the Housing Authority, and the efficiency of its staff have been praised by critical agencies. The Cleveland Museum of Art hopes that this exhibit will contribute to still greater success, through a heightened general interest in the social, economic and democratic problems involved, and a broadened acquaintance with what has been done here and throughout the United States.

There are many different opinions about traffic laws and whether they are necessary or not. Many believe that there are too many laws for driving, that they are too strictly enforced and that traffic would move along just as well without most of the restrictions. One motorist, who has a record for safe and skillful driving, had a different view. Traffic laws, in his opinion, are only written rules for courtesy in the use of our streets and highways. That this manner of encouraging good driving manner must be backed up by a system of fines and other penalties is proof of their necessity.

Traffic Safety

Another serious problem in modern traffic is to develop a sense of responsibility for safety in the pedestrian and some consideration for the limitations and rights of the motorist. Everyone knows how the man on foot will foolishly endanger his life and depend upon the motorist to avoid an accident. It is hoped that enforcement of the jaywalking laws will develop better walking manners and urge the man on foot to use reasonable care for his life and limb when he steps into the street.

One of the most remarkable phenomena in America during recent years has been the revival of the legitimate theater as contrasted with the movies, which at one time were supposed to have rung the death-knell of the stage. Much credit for this goes to the Little Theater movement, which is growing by leaps and bounds all over the country.

Some time ago, Windsor French writing in the Cleveland Press from Williamstown, Mass., put it this way: "It occurs to me that while the movies seem to be sinking deeper and deeper into despair, the theater is continually gaining in strength. Look at the records. All spring and summer Hollywood hasn't sent us a half a dozen films of any real distinction or merit. . . . On the other hand, in New England alone, anywhere you look, the summer has been frantic with Broadway's children, and indeed sometimes Hollywood's, busily acting behind the footlights. . . ."

"Unknown eager youngsters have sat down at the boarding house dinner tables with the recognized great and they have all had the time of their lives. . . . The amazing thing, however, is that these youngsters are not nearly as beglamoured by Hollywood as they are stage struck."

Did it ever occur to you that our own Slovene community here in Cleveland is very fortunate in having fine National Homes with well-equipped stages, the largest of them on St. Clair Ave., which, now that the old timers are gradually retiring, offer a wonderful opportunity to the young generation to show its talents in things dramatic?

Tomorrow, the Cankar Players are opening the season with the presentation of a three-act play, "The Son." A good proportion of the cast is comprised of American-born young Slovenes. Latter in the season a play in English will be given by the group.

The dramatic clubs founded by our older folks are a good basis on which to build, and the new generation will do well to continue with the good work and thereby enrich the cultural life of the community. These are our own Little Theaters. Give them your support, and if you feel the urge—join them! *VJG.*

Large-scale housing is becoming an increasingly important part of the pattern of every American city. Public housing is contributing to the social and economic health of our urban communities; it is also contributing to the beauty of the city, substituting simple, well-designed homes and green lawns for disorder and dirt. Therefore, the Cleveland Museum of Art has brought to Cleveland a housing exhibit which will be at the Museum through November 9th.

The Museum is open, free, each week day except Monday, from 9 until 5. On Wednesday and Friday evenings it is open until 10 p. m. and on Sundays from 2 until 6, always free.

As Mr. William M. Milliken, director of the Museum, points out, the Art Museum played a significant part in stimulating

New Books About Yugoslavia

Petrovich, Svetislav-Sveta: "Free Yugoslavia Calling"

(Greystone Press. \$3.00). This volume contains a large amount of useful material, not only about the current crisis in Yugoslavia but also about the assassination of King Alexander, about Poland and Macedonia, the Czechs, about Hungary and Mr. Tibor Eckhardt, about Bismarck and Hitler, and about the aims and policies of Nazi Germany. The title of the book is too narrow for the scope which it covers. In his treatment of Yugoslavia, the author is remarkably free from excessive nationalism. He shuns bombastic phrases and cites the evidence of reputable American observers. He looks at the past and into the future from the point of view of a Yugoslav whose faith in the essential unity of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes remains unshaken by the conflict which now rages in that country. The author is a distinguished Yugoslav newspaperman and radio commentator.

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Harrison, H. D.: "The Soul of Yugoslavia" (Hodder & Stoughton, London). Mr. Harrison spent fourteen years as the Balcan correspondent of the London "News Chronicle." The author describes the political history of Yugoslavia and the national customs and traditions of the people. (V. T.)

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Adamic's "Two-Way Passage" Widely Acclaimed by People in All Walks of Life

Louis Adamic's latest book, "Two-Way Passage," which was reviewed on this page last week, is causing discussion and excitement in which people all over the country are participating. Radio, newspaper people, educators and common citizens seem to be equally intrigued by the plan proposed by the Slovene-born writer for defeat of Hitlerism and the pacification of Europe.

Last Sunday night "Two-Way Passage" was discussed on "One Man's Family" radio program, which is listened to by 22 million people. Other radio talks of it are being planned. It wouldn't be surprising if influential circles in Washington were to begin to show interest in Adamic's idea.

Today we shall take a few excerpts culled from opinions of reviewers, men in the public limelight and average citizens.

Ted Robinson in the Cleveland Plain Dealer: "Here's your book, exciting on every page, hopeful and high minded. The only hope for Europe lies in revolution, and the only desirable kind of revolution is revolution for democracy, and the only practical kind is an American revolution, conducted in each country by the nationals of that country who have lived and learned in the United States. . . . Finally—if you want to know how close to home the Nazi poison is striking read the story told on Page 18 to Page 22, inclusive. It is the story about Cleveland."

Harry Bingham, publisher of the Louisville Courier-Journal, in personal letter to the author: "Your book rang a bell for me. . . . You have struck the first real spark of spiritual offensive against totalitarianism. . . . We can never win this war in any sense by seeking only to defend our past or our present. We must strike out to create a future much better worth defending. Your plan seems to me an important first step in that direction."

Van Wyck Brooks, foremost American critic: "The suggestion offered in 'Two-Way Passage' has within it such grand possibilities that it ought to be explored to the limit."

George Britt, chief editorial writer of the New York Post: "I think your basic idea is a contribution of first-rate importance to the solution of the main thing that has to be settled. I expect to see it take its recognized place in history as the original statement of something that is to have a part in shaping future events."

Prof. Franz F. Exner, Carleton College, Northfield, Minn.: "It may seem fantastic to some people, but what of it? Have not most unorthodox ideas seemed fantastic in the beginning?"

Prof. Arthur Schlesinger, Harvard University: "I don't know how practicable your proposal

is, but I do know that you have called attention to certain creative resources in our population which should be used, in some way or other, for hastening the collapse of the dictatorships and tem of sanity in the Old World, reestablishing an enduring system."

Dr. Abraham Stone, New York City: "No one, to my knowledge, has given so clear-cut a dissection of the confusion and the chaos and the uncertainties in our midst, and no one has pointed out so clearly the paramount need for a unified American program."

James P. Warburg, coordinator of Information and important man in the Roosevelt administration: "To me the suggestion contained in the end of your book is a daring concept, which I suspect may be very nearly right from an idealistic point of view. . . . To my mind the thought is brilliantly stated, because it is simply stated, because so much is left to the imagination of the reader. . . . A really fine piece of work."

George Shuster, president of Hunter College, New York City: "What I appreciated particularly about your approach to the problem was the ability to be objective and, at the same time, frankly dedicated to the preservation and development of those ideals to which the best Americans have always aspired."

Stanley M. Isaacs, president of Borough of Manhattan, New York City: "I think the book should have the widest possible circulation and that you should keep right on in the work that you are doing. The 'Two-Way Passage' idea is certainly sound."

William Smith, Oberlin, Ohio: "Your 'Two-Way Passage' interests me greatly. I like your spirit and purpose and your suggestions are really inviting."

Mrs. Gene Newton, Chicago, Ill.: "Two-Way Passage is a daring book. There is a group besides the foreign born who would gladly go 'back.' I think many of us are sickened by the 'V for Britain,' the 'annihilation of Hitler' propaganda and would welcome something less bloody and more constructive."

Miriam Ashley Kozelka, Chicago, Ill.: "I hope your book works. I think it is great. It is rather fantastic but then, so is Hitler. If F. D. R. accepts the idea wholeheartedly it will work because he always gets what he wants."

Miss Margaret Omer, Johnstown, Pa.: "Many times my father (Slovenian-born) has spoken of a system in Europe 'just like here,' and now I feel he may see that hope in old reality for the 'new old Old Country.' Since completing 'Two-Way Passage,' my copy has been in constant circulation, and I intend to keep it moving."

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
