Politika glede farmarskega vprašanja na kritičnem rešetku

Farmarjem se hoče "pomagati" z odpravo davka na dedščino. Poplava reke Mississippi je pokazala, koliko je tej stranki za farmarje.

Washington, D. C. — Benjamin C. Marsh, tajnik Ljudske lige za rekonstrukcijo, je podal izjavo, v kateri biča politiko republikanske stranke glede pomoči farmarjem.

"Predsednikovo delovanje ob času povodnji Mississippija pokazuje tipično brezbrzičnost napram farmarjem," pravi Marsh.

"Medtem ko se priporoča znižanje davkov na velike dohodke in se molče odobrava preklic davka na dedščino, amata predsednik svojo navzočnost, akozi podjetje med farmarji za splošno zdravlilo resnega položaja, v katerem se farmarji nahajajo. V mississippijski poplavi njeni krajinji varuje štab žrtve vladne nezmoglosti pred umiranjem od gladi z deljenjem miloščine, dokler jim vlada lahko ne voči vselega in srečnega Novoga leta.

"Pokojni poljedelci tajnik Henry C. Wallace je izjavil leta 1924, da je nadprodukcija na farmah povzročila, da so prišle cene za poljske produkte padli, ker so farmarji sledili patriotičnemu klicu, naj povečajo produkcijo v vojnem času.

"Vladni tarif, tujezemski davki, davki in transportne smerne povzročajo, da poljedelstvo ne nosi dobička. To je, kar povzroča produkcije stroške na farmi in stroške za odvažanje teh produktov na trg, take da je zelo nečloveško, ako se priporoča farmarju, ki ne more izhajati, da naj ostane na farmi. Farmarji, ki ne morejo zdaj izhajati, bodo lahko izhajali, kadar bodo prišli no boben."

To so besede, s katerimi je Marsh obsodil politiko republikanske stranke za odpravo farmarjem.

Burna konvencija poljske jednote

Dve frakciji se tepeta za kontrolo velike organizacije.

Chicago. — Poljska narodna zveza, podporna organizacija ameriških Poljakov, ki šteje 250.000 članov in poseduje \$15.000.000 premoženja, ima ta teden svojo 25. redno konvencijo v hotelu Sherman. Navzočih je 500 delegatov, med katerimi je mnogo poljskih bankirjev, sodnikov in javnih uradnikov.

Konvencija je bila odprta med ljutim bojem obeh frakcij, radikalno in konservativno, ki se tepeta za kontrolo organizacije. Prva seja je bila tako burna, da je bila poklicana cela četa policajev v hotel v priklonovanju, da pride do pretepa. Konservativni voditelji so obtožili radikale, da so privedli veliko številno delegatov, ki niso pravilno izvoljeni. Konservativci bi radi izključili okoli 50 delegatov iz konvencije. Poverilni odbor pa je zaključil v prilog radikalcem, nakar so konservativci dvignili tak hrup, da je morala priti policija. Konvencija prvi dan še ni bila organizirana. Zdaj je v sedlu konservativna stran s čikaškimi bankirjem Johnom Smulskim na čelu, ki je poskrbel, da je bila konvencija odprta s slovesno mašo v poljski katoliški cerkvi in krajni predsednik Cermak je pozdravil delegate ter jim izročil zlati ključ.

Poljska narodna zveza izdaja svoj dnevnik in tednik. Njeni mesečni prejemki znašajo \$600.000.

KLERIKALNA ZAROTA NA DUNAJU RAZKRITA

To zaroto je dognala nepristranska preiskava. — V komisiji so tudi klerikalci imeli svojega zastopnika.

Zeneva, Švica. — Po končanih dunajskih nemirih je dunajski mestni svet sestavljal komisijo za preiskavo nemirov, v dva zastopnika nasprotnih strank. Komisija je predsedoval dr. Dannenberg, predsednik deželnega zbora, ki je bil obenem zanjo poročevalec.

Komisija je prejela od policije poročilo, ki ga je primerjala z izpovedmi priča, zaaljšanih pred komisijo. Na to je komisija zastavila policiji veliko vprašanj, da dožene resnico. Glavni stan policije pa ni odgovoril na vprašanja na nasvet svetovalec dr. Seipella. Komisija je na to zaključila svojo preiskavo in je svoje poročilo podala občinskemu svetu. Komisija izjavlja, da je zelo značilno obnašanje policije in zvezne vlade, ker pokazuje, da je to nov poizkus potlačiti resnico o dogodkih dne 15. julija na Dunaju. Poročilo pravi, da so bile priprave policije za ta dan zelo defektivne. Na to nadaljuje, da je policija pričela streljati, ko je republikanska straža napravila prosto pot za ognjeveščice do justične palače. Poročilo omenja, kako divjaško se je obnašala policija, ko je bila demonstracija že zdavnaj končana. Streljala je na neoborožene ljudi brez vsake potrebe in provokacije. Policija je oddala šals na ljudstvo, ki je iskalo zavetja v Mestni hiši. Streljala je tudi na pasante, ki niso imeli opraviti ničesar z demonstracijo.

Preiskava je dalje dognala, da vodilni organi policije niso ničesar podvzeli, da označijo vesti o podivjanosti ljudstva, da so neresnične. Glasilo Krščansko socijalne zveze se je posebno odlikovalo v raznašanju takih lažljivih vesti. Policija je imela pri sebi municijo, ki napravi tak učinek, kakor razupite "dum-dum" kroglice. Končno poročilo naglašja, da so bila človeška življenja uničena po krivdi policije.

Znano je, da je policija, ki je streljala na ljudstvo, pod zapovedništvom klerikalne zvezne vlade, kakor so bili orožniki pod klerikalno deželno vlado v Sloveniji, ko so streljali na ljudstvo na Zaloški cesti. Ta fakt pove, kdo je zakrivil masaker na Dunaju dne 15. julija t. l.

Nov spor v Ligi narodov

Konflikt med Ogrsko in Rumunijo razburil duhove.

Zeneva, 20. sept. — V vodilnih krogih Lige narodov so si spet v laseh radi konflikta med Ogrsko in Rumunijo. Ker Rumunija ne plača odškodnine za zaplenjena madžarska poselstva na Sedmograškem, se je Ogrska pritožila na Ligo. Svet Lige narodov, ki je imel zadevo rešiti, je pa večerj odložil stvar za tri mesece. Ogrska zdaj grozi, da izstopi iz Lige. Med razpravo o tej zadevi so se spet pojavili nekdanji zavezniki entente in centralnih držav, ki razsojajo ogrsko-rumunsko afero s stališča zmage in poraza v vojni.

MORGANOVA KUČA IZGUBLILA LEPO POGAČO

Zelezniški družbi se ni treba poslužiti Wall Streeta za prodajo delnic. — Tako je odločila meddržavna trgovska komisija.

Washington, D. C. — Meddržavna trgovska komisija je pripravila trdiko Morgan & Co. ob lepo masleno pogajo \$1.000.000. Po komisarju Eastmanu je odobrila peticojo New Haven železniške družbe, da sme izdati za \$50.000.000 delnic. Toda k temu je dodala, da lahko te delnice proda med sedanjimi delničarji in drugimi, ne da bi ji bilo treba plačati lepo provizijo finančnikom v Wall Streetu.

Finančniki v Wall Streetu so se že veselili krasne provizije, ko komisija dovoli železniški družbi razpečati za petdeset milijonov dolarjev delnic. Zdjaj ne bo nič iz tega, ako železniška družba pokaže na svet komisije, ki je z gospodarskega stališča zelo pameten, ker sebi prihrani tisti milijon, ki bi ga dala finančnikom v Wall Streetu, da razpečajo delnice, ki jih je meddržavna trgovska komisija že odobrila.

Odobrenje delnic po meddržavni trgovski komisiji pomeni, da so delnice na dobri gospodarski podlagi in da jih ljudstvo brez skrbi kupuje, ne da bi se mu bilo treba bati, da nekaj kupuje, kar nima nobene vrednosti.

Pariz, 20. sept. — Ko je večerj 14.000 članov Ameriške legije, bivših vojakov na zapadni fronti, marširalo po pariških ulicah pred otvoritvijo njihove konvencije v Parizu, so francoski komunisti na več krajih priredili sovražne demonstracije proti Američanom. Nemiri so bili toliko bolj boleči, ker so bili komunisti pomešani v majhnih grupah med drugimi tisočermi gledalci. Trindvajset komunistov je bilo aretiranih, ko so med parado skakali.

V predmestju Clichy, ki je komunistična občina, so imeli komunisti protestni šod proti Ameriški legiji. Shoda ni motila nihče. Komunistični občinski odbor je istočasno zboroval in prekrstil glavni trg v "La Place Sacco e Vanzetti."

PROHIBIČNI AGENT MORILEC.

Leornadtown, Md. — Randolph Brewer, eden izmed štirih prohibičnih agentov, ki so ustrelili farmarja C. B. Gundlacha, ko so brez dovoljenja udri v njegovo hišo, je bil 19. t. m. pridržan v zaporu na obtožbo umora prve vrste. Dva sta bila izpuščena proti jamčevini, tretji je pa v bolnišnici ranjen na nogo, kjer ga je zadela krogla iz farmarjeve puške. Zena ubitega farmarja je edina priča. Izjavila je, da je Gundlach samo enkrat ustrelil iz puške, ko je četvorica naskočila hišo, nato pa je pred pragom pokleknil in prosil milosti. Brewer ga je ustrelil klečečega in prosičega. Umor je bil izvršen zadnje nedelje.

They have been out of work for six months, and still there is no sign that they will soon go back to work; so that they can be able to eat a hearty meal and give their children enough to eat. We, who live in the cities, have not as yet suffered any such great privations and that's why it will be hard for you to understand the terrible conditions under which some of our people are living. But you must have seen some of the results of this calamity. And that is the influx of many people into the great industrial centers of the country. They come with the idea and hope that they can get a job in the city and thereby make a better living than they can at home.
